Course Description:	An introduction to the structure and working of the U.S. legal system with an emphasis on understanding basic legal terminology, principles, and effective statutory and case law analysis.

Students must attend a minimum of 80% (12 hours, or 8 of 10 classes) of the class sessions during each semester. Roll will be taken at each class.
